

YARD WASTE INCLUDES:



Leaves, garden residue, shrubbery with no dirt attached, limbs, twigs, brush and tree trimmings, and similar items, but does not include grass clippings.

Yard waste must be placed in a bio degradable paper bag. Tree trimmings not to exceed 3-inches in diameter; brush,

limbs, twigs and shrubbery must be bundled in lengths not to exceed 4 feet.



REMINDERS:

- Please place all trash in a garbage bag before placing in your garbage can to keep from blowing around the neighborhood.
- Please cut down your cardboard to fit in the cart and do not overload your recycling cart or place items on top of the cart.

MS4 AND SHALER



With an ever-changing quandary of rules, regulations and requirements, stormwater management in Pennsylvania often can be confusing to understand. Hopefully, the information below will help residents of Shaler Township to know why these requirements are in place. As you will discover, these requirements are mandated by federal and state laws.

What is an MS4? An MS4, or Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System, is comprised of drainage systems including streets, catch basins, curbs, gutters, ponds, ditches, manmade channels and storm pipes owned by a state, county, city, town, township, borough or other public entity. Untreated or uncontrolled stormwater runoff is the number one cause of impairment in our local waterways. Polluted runoff is often transported through municipal drainage systems until it eventually discharges untreated into streams, lakes and rivers. Most municipalities — including Shaler Township — are required to comply with the MS4 Program.

MS4 Programs are intended to improve our nation's surface waters by reducing the quantities of pollutants that are picked up by runoff and transported into the storm sewer systems during rainfall. As part of the MS4 Program, municipalities hold a permit to discharge stormwater into local waterways. In Pennsylvania, the MS4 Program is administered by the Department of Environmental Protection (DEP).

The MS4 Program has six elements termed "minimum control measures" that, when implemented, should result in significant reduction in pollutants discharged into receiving waters. The six minimum control measures and the actions required include:

Public Education and Outreach — Distribute educational materials and conduct outreach to inform citizens about the impacts that stormwater runoff has on water quality.

Public Participation/ Involvement — Provide opportunities for residents to participate in the stormwater management program or other programs which improve water quality.

Illicit Discharge Detection and Elimination — Develop and implement a plan to detect and eliminate non-stormwater discharges into the stormwater system.


Construction Site Runoff Control — Develop, implement and enforce an erosion and sediment control program for construction site activities that disturb one acre or greater.

Post-Construction Runoff Control — Develop, implement and enforce a program to address discharges of post-construction stormwater runoff from new development or redevelopment areas.



Pollution Prevention/Good Housekeeping — Develop and implement a program that reduces or prevents pollutant runoff from municipal operations.

management techniques. It started very simply. The Township has been on a quest to put into action pragmatic and constantly up-to-date best management practices in managing stormwater throughout the Township. This quest more recently, under U.S. EPA and PA DEP direction, focuses on water quality along with stormwater management techniques.




Every resident can participate in their municipal stormwater program by reducing or preventing pollutant runoff from their own property and by reporting any non-stormwater discharges into the township's drainage system.

There are numerous things we can do on a daily basis to keep pollution out of our waterways. The following are just a few things we all can do to help improve water quality on our streams, rivers and lakes:

- Never dump anything into storm drains, swales or streams
- Pick up litter from the street before it gets into storm drains
- Use limited amounts of fertilizer
- If you must use pesticides, search for an environmentally-friendly brand
- Recycle motor oil, paint and other hazardous chemicals. Never dump such materials down the drain or into the storm system
- Recycle glass, plastic and aluminum
- Always pick up your pet's waste, or else harmful bacteria can get into our water

All municipalities should be committed to improving water quality through better management of stormwater runoff. Shaler Township is committed to this goal. Immediately upon the adoption of the Stormwater Management Act in 1978, Shaler Township embraced the implementation of stormwater

WHAT IS AN ILLICIT DISCHARGE?



An illicit discharge is defined as any discharge to the Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System that is not composed entirely of stormwater. These non-stormwater discharges occur due to illegal connections to the storm drain system from business or commercial establishments. As a result of these illicit connections, contaminated wastewater enters into storm drains or directly into streams before receiving treatment from a wastewater treatment plant. Illicit connections may be intentional or may be unknown to the business owner and often are due to the connection of floor drains to the storm sewer system. Additional sources of illicit discharges can be failing septic systems, illegal dumping practices and the improper disposal of sewage from recreational practices such as boating or camping.

Illicit discharge detection and elimination programs are designed to prevent contamination of ground and surface water supplies by monitoring, inspection and removal of these illegal non-stormwater discharges.

FALL RUN PARK REPAIRS

The Township has contracted with Gateway Engineers to study the replacement of the bridges in Fall Run Park that were damaged during the September, 2015 storms. The engineering report recommended the following upgrades to the park to prevent additional damage in future storms:

- realignment of portions of the stream to prevent further bank erosion
- raising the bridge abutments and bridges above the stream bed to prevent future wash outs of the foundations, if the bridges are not raised and the abutments affixed to a foundation, the bridges will continue to wash away resulting in additional damage.
- banking of the stream banks to prevent additional erosion
- the repair of a small landslide in the middle of the park.

The Township has approved a contract with Gateway Engineers to complete the design of the recommendations along with planned expenses for the improvements. The Township is applying for several grants to assist with the costs of this project as initial estimates exceed \$900,000. The project will likely be completed in several phases spanning 2-3 years due to funding limitations and grant requirements.

Many crimes throughout the area have been solved and resulted in arrests based upon evidence obtained from surveillance cameras. The Township hopes that the installation of a camera in this area will capture a highly traveled area. The Shaler Township Police Department seeks to use all available resources to investigate crimes occurring within Shaler Township as well as assisting other agencies with investigations. SHARE THE ROAD!



Observing these simple suggestions will make Shaler a safe and fun place to ride a bike.

BICYCLISTS SAFETY GUIDELINES:

- Bicyclists should ride on the right side of the road with the flow of traffic observing the same rules as cars with regard to traffic signals.
- Cyclists should wear bright clothing, ride in a predictable manner, and signal intentions to drivers with hand signals.
- The use of a rear view mirror on the helmet makes it much easier to navigate traffic.
- Finally, at night it is crucial to use proper lighting (front and back) and to wear a reflective vest. Visibility is the key to staying alive.

DRIVERS – PLEASE BE AWARE:

- Bicyclists have a legal right to the lane and can take as much road as they need for safety reasons.
 - Please pay attention to the road, slow down, and give bicyclists at least four feet of clearance when passing, which is the state law.
 - Drivers can cross the center line when passing.

BEING A GOOD NEIGHBOR

- Please do not let your dog bark constantly outside.
- Always keep your pets under control either in your yard, in your house, or on a leash.
- Clean up after your dog while walking in your neighborhood.
- Trash and recycling cans should not be placed at the curb until 6:00 p.m. the evening before your pick up day. Trash and recycling cans should not be stored at the curb or in the front yard.
- Remove your trash and recycling cans from the curb by the end of the collection day.
- Clean up trash, debris, food and animal droppings in your yard and keep your grass cut regularly. This will keep rats and other animals from invading your neighborhood.
- Please be considerate of your neighbors when recreational burning. Use only clean wood products or other clean-burning fuels. Recreational fires must be at least 15 feet from the nearest structure, inhabited area, roadway, property line, or utility and attended at all times.
- Please do not throw litter and cigarette butts on our public streets.
- Please clear grass and leaves from the street when mowing. Keep grass under six inches in length.
- Please keep your trees and shrubs trimmed and debris cleared from your neighbor's property.
- Please do not throw debris or litter in storm sewers or catch basins.
- Please do not block your neighbor's driveway and be courteous of where you park.
- Please do not feed the deer. The growth of the deer population brings concerns of deer to car accidents.


